Application Process Report.—(1) In general.—Not later than December 1, 2012, and annually thereafter, the Secretary shall submit to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Environment and Public Works of the Senate a report that includes a list of all of the letters of interest and applications received from project sponsors for assistance under the TIFIA [Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act of 1998] program during the preceding fiscal year. (2) Inclusions.—(A) In general.—Each report under paragraph (1) shall include, at a minimum, a description of, with respect to each letter of interest and application included in the report—

- (i) the date on which the letter of interest or application was received;
- (ii) the date on which a notification was provided to the project sponsor regarding whether the application was complete or incomplete;
- (iii) the date on which a revised and completed application was submitted (if applicable);
- (iv) the date on which a notification was provided to the project sponsor regarding whether the project was approved or disapproved; and
- (v) if the project was not approved, the reason for the disapproval.
- (B) Correspondence.—Each report under paragraph (1) shall include copies of any correspondence provided to the project sponsor in accordance with section 602(d) [informing the applicant whether its application is complete or incomplete and whether the Secretary approved or disapproved the application].

Introduction

This document responds to the legislative direction that the Secretary report on TIFIA letters of interest and applications DOT receives each fiscal year (FY). This report covers FY 2023. The body of the report summarizes the information, and Appendix A contains copies of Bureau correspondence regarding application completeness and approval.

TIFIA Background

The Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act of 1998 (TIFIA)² established the program under which USDOT may provide three forms of credit assistance—secured (direct) loans, loan guarantees, and standby lines of credit—for eligible transportation projects. Unlike traditional grant programs, TIFIA aims to leverage Federal funds by attracting substantial private and other non-Federal co-investment in transportation projects, by providing long-term supplemental or subordinate financing on flexible repayment terms. Eligible borrowers include

state departments of transportation, transit operators, toll road authorities, special purpose authorities, local governments, and private entities.

TIFIA assistance can equal up to 49 percent of eligible project costs, with the balance of funding coming from other lending, equity investment, user charges, tax revenues, and federal, state, and local grants. USDOT policy typically limits TIFIA assistance to 33 percent of eligible costs. Project sponsors often combine TIFIA loans with other debt, including the Bureau's private activity bond allocations.

TIFIA eligibility includes the following project types: highways, bridges and tunnels; transit facilities and vehicles; operations and maintenance facilities; intercity bus and passenger rail vehicles and stations; intermodal freight facilities; intelligent transportation systems; port access and transfer facilities; rural infrastructure; state infrastructure banks rural projects funds; natural habitats that mitigate impact of transportation projects; transit-oriented development; and airports.

Borrowers must repay TIFIA credit assistance and interest from pledged revenue streams, such as project-based revenues, general obligation bonds, or future tax revenue. USDOT can tailor repayment terms to borrower needs and preferences, construction schedules, and useful lives of project elements. Borrowers must achieve investment-grade credit ratings and meet other statutory and USDOT project and financial requirements.

The Build America Bureau (Bureau) within USDOT's Office of the Secretary of Transportation, Under Secretary of Transportation for Policy, manages the TIFIA program and other programs offering project sponsors credit support, tax-advantaged debt, targeted grant funding, and technical assistance.

Credit Assistance Process

Reflecting statute and USDOT policy and practice, the credit assistance process formally begins when a project sponsor submits a draft letter of interest (LOI) to the Bureau. The Bureau provides its LOI template on the public website,³ which asks the sponsor to describe the project location, purpose, and cost; demonstrate the sponsor's ability to fulfill federal requirements for transportation projects and TIFIA eligibility; and outline the proposed financial plan, including requested TIFIA credit assistance, federal grants, state and local funds, and private investment. Bureau staff work with the project sponsor to ensure all requirements are met and identify statutory, regulatory, financing, timing, or other issues that could prevent or delay TIFIA assistance. This engagement between the Bureau and project sponsor helps the sponsor refine and complete its final LOI for USDOT consideration.

After DOT accepts the LOI, the Bureau begins creditworthiness review, underwriting, and negotiating assistance terms and conditions.⁴ External financial and legal professionals help the Bureau evaluate the proposed credit assistance terms and borrower creditworthiness. In most cases, project sponsors pay the cost of the Bureau's external advisors. Creditworthiness reviews involve evaluation of the plan of finance, financial model, feasibility of the anticipated pledged revenue, and other considerations.

The Bureau invites the project sponsor to apply formally for credit assistance after the Bureau confirms the borrower's and project's eligibility, creditworthiness, ability to repay federal credit assistance, and agreement on terms to protect the public interest, such as appropriate debt to income coverage ratios, rate covenants, and reserves. Project sponsors typically begin preparing their applications during creditworthiness review. The Bureau provides its application template on the public website. Within 30 days of receipt of an application, the Bureau notifies the potential borrower whether its application is complete. The Bureau recommends the application for the Secretary's consideration, through the Council on Credit and Finance, after the Bureau determines the application is complete. The Bureau notifies the applicant in writing whether the Secretary approves or disapproves its application.

Letters of Interest and Applications

In FY 2023, the Bureau received 11 LOIs and accepted 8 applications, and USDOT approved 7 applications (<u>Table 1</u>). The Secretary did not disapprove any applications in FY 2023.

The 11 LOIs requested \$2.7 billion in TIFIA credit assistance (<u>Table 2</u>). USDOT provided \$554 million in loans for the 7 approved applications. For six projects in Table 2, the Bureau did not send formal notices of application approval due to a processing lapse. Nevertheless, the Secretary approved the applications, and the Bureau executed the loans.
