



Transit Resource Sheet

Transit that is accessible and equitable can serve as a catalyst for mobility and economic development within communities. This resource list provides some planning, technical resources, and grant opportunities for transit systems to connect neighborhoods and people to important destinations and modernize bus and rail fleets, replace transit vehicles with cleaner, greener vehicles, improve transit service for communities that have historically had more limited access to transit, and upgrade station accessibility

Formula Grant Funding Programs

Most federal transportation funding flows through formula grants. Formula grant programs allocate funding to recipients based on formulas set by Congress. DOT distributes these funds directly to States, federally recognized Tribal recipients, and transit agencies. The funds may be further allocated to localities at State, Tribal, or agency discretion.

Among the largest formula funding programs are the Federal-Aid Highway Program, which apportions funding to state DOTs by formula, and the <u>Urbanized Area Formula Grants (Section 5307)</u> that fund transit capital and operating assistance. <u>Formula Grants for Rural Areas (Section 5311)</u> provide capital, planning, and operating assistance to States and Federally recognized Tribes to support public transportation in rural areas. States may choose to <u>transfer a portion of their Federal Highway formula funds to support transit</u>.

FTA formula funds also support <u>Enhanced Mobility of Seniors & Individuals with Disabilities - Section 5310</u>. This program provides formula funding to states and designated recipients to meet the transportation needs of older adults and people with disabilities when the transportation service provided is unavailable, insufficient, or inappropriate to meeting these needs.

FTA's Section 5310 program allows grantees to coordinate and assist in regularly providing meal delivery service for homebound individuals if the delivery service does not conflict with providing public transportation service or reduce service to public transportation passengers. Whether pursuing formula or discretionary grant funds, communities should work with their state DOTs, metropolitan planning organizations, and transit agencies who play an important role in the planning and programming of these funds. For any project to be funded by DOT, it must be included in the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) or the metropolitan planning organizations' Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).
