MICD is a leadership initiative of the National Endowment for the Arts in partnership with the United States Conference of Mayors. Since 1986, we've offered collaborative learning programs and resources to mayors in order to make a purposeful, positive impact on America.







MICD Programs

Institute Sessions

Institute Sessions are the core of MICD. At these collaborative workshops, mayors engage with design leaders to find solutions to the most critical planning and design challenges facing their cities. Sessions are organized around case study projects: Each mayor presents a project from their city and receives feedback from other mayors and design leaders.

MICD Just City Mayoral Fellowship

The MICD Just City Mayoral Fellowship is a unique, highly interactive, semester-long program that brings together a small group of mayors and their staff to directly tackle injustices in each of their cities through planning and design interventions.

Virtual Seminars

Virtual Seminars are engaging and interactive learning and discussion opportunities for small groups of mayors and city staff. Each one-hour seminar features a deep-dive presentation on a single timely topic from a design expert, followed by a moderated group discussion among the attending mayors and city staff.

Alumni Advising

MICD Alumni Advising helps mayors continue addressing the complex challenges facing today's cities, beyond the traditional Institute Session model. This program matches mayors and two of their staff members with two design experts with niche expertise relevant to the project at hand.



Institute Sessions

Our flagship program since 1986.

Institute Sessions are the core of MICD. At these collaborative workshops, mayors engage with design leaders to find solutions to the most critical planning and design challenges facing their cities.

Each mayor presents a project from their city and receives feedback from other mayors and design leaders. Past projects have included the following topics: neighborhood revitalization, transportation planning, arts and culture, district visioning, main street and commercial corridor redevelopment, affordable housing, equitable development, historic preservation, and sustainable development.





MICD Alumni Assistance and Advising programs help alumni mayors continue addressing the complex challenges facing today's cities.

MICD matches recent alumni mayors with a pair of nationally renowned design experts to advise the mayor on their selected city design challenge. Each pair of experts will advise the mayor and a small team of their staff, with a strong focus on immediate next-step recommendations and implementation strategies.




Envisioning waterfront development for all

FRANKFORT — KY
MAYOR LAYNE WILKERSON

Leveraging city-owned property along the Kentucky River in the shadow of historic redlining and urban renewal

- + Adopt a vision framework plan, like the RiverFirst plan in Minneapolis, to guide all projects toward the goal of embracing the river as the city's "front porch"
- + Set up an independent authority with the power to assemble property and negotiate development
- + Partner with a nearby tourist attraction to hold temporary events that draw people to the riverfront



Building a "Seamless City"

COLUMBUS — MS
MAYOR KEITH GASKIN

Leveraging anticipated federal funding for a Superfund site to best benefit the surrounding residents

- + Start with a community visioning exercise that dusts off past plans and gets people excited about a clear vision
- + Include requirements for a great public realm and interaction across building/parcel lines in RFPs
- + Start with temporary structures that create immediate transformations and can be expanded over time



MICD Just City Mayoral Fellowship

In-depth training on achieving justice in the built environment.

This unique and highly interactive program brings together a small group of mayors to directly tackle injustices in each of their cities through planning and design interventions.

The 2025 Fellowship will follow a hybrid in-person and virtual format between February and April of 2025. An open call for expressions of interest will be conducted in Fall 2025




From stormwater infrastructure to social infrastructure

- + Seek out world-class designers and engagement experts to achieve the generational impacts this neighborhood deserves



Supporting economically distressed neighborhoods

ALLENTOWN — PA
MAYOR MATT TUERK

Translating a workforce development project in an immigrant community into the built environment

- + Build a compelling narrative with a strong identity for this project to rally the community and attract funding
- + Take an asset-based approach, exploring what residents in this neighborhood have and love
- + Target pilot efforts toward creating a "neighborhood main street" on one of the area's key corridors
