Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964



"No person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin,

be **excluded** from participation in, be **denied** the benefits of, or be subject to **discrimination**

under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance."





- To prevent subsidizing discrimination with Federal funds
- To address grants issued under the "separate but equal" doctrine that permitted discrimination
- To provide an alternative to litigating each instance of alleged discrimination



Title VI and Language Access



- Lau v. Nichols (1974)
 - Title VI national origin discrimination
 - "Simple justice requires that public funds, to which all taxpayers of all races contribute, not be spent in any fashion which encourages, entrenches, subsidizes, or results in racial discrimination."
- Executive Order 13166 (2000)
 - Improving Access to Services for Persons With Limited English Proficiency (LEP)



DOT Title VI Order (June 2021)




- Reinvigorates DOT's Title VI program

Title VI – What to Look Out for



- Exclusion from participation, denial of benefits, or other discrimination based on race, color, or national origin
 - Intentional or unintentional
- Intimidation or retaliation
- Harassment or hostile environment
 - Includes conduct by DOT recipients or third parties







- A State DOT initiates a road project and construction blocks access to Hmong businesses.
- The State DOT did not conduct public engagement or outreach informing the members of community or business owners.





- A State DOT initiates a road project connecting a city to the nearby beaches.
- A project sponsor made a statement about requiring low bridge clearances to prevent Black and Latino residents who primarily use buses from accessing beaches in predominantly white neighborhoods.








- A DMV requires everyone applying for a driver's license to provide proof of legal status.
- The DMV refuses to accept an applicant's documentation issued by Puerto Rico, not realizing Puerto Rico is a part of the United States.
- A DMV requires everyone to remove head coverings for their driver's license photograph.
- The DMV refuses to make an exception for a practicing Sikh individual who wears head coverings in public for religious purposes.



- A bus rider regularly gets mocked by a bus driver about her appearance or accent, and the bus rider reports this to her local transit agency.
- The transit agency refuses to address her complaint, telling her that the driver is "just joking around."







- Airport lounge customers complain to staff that a group of Latino customers are making other people uncomfortable because they are speaking another language.
- The staff call airport security, who escort the Latino customers out of the lounge.

Title VI Violations vs. Hate Crimes



- *Title VI violation*: A federally funded program or activity excludes a person, denies them benefits, or otherwise subjects them to discrimination based on race, color, or national origin (including LEP)
- Bias or hate incident: Acts of prejudice that are not crimes and do not involve violence, threats, or property damage.
- *Hate crime*: At the Federal level, a crime motivated by bias against race, color, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, or disability.
