2012 in Review

The 5th meeting of the U.S.-China Transportation Forum in Hangzhou, China focused on the importance of technology and innovation.

In Hangzhou, Assistant Secretary for Aviation and International Affairs, Susan Kurland and Vice Minister of Transportation Weng Mengyong agreed on the importance of using technology to further integrate and enhance transportation systems.

As part of his keynote speech, Weng highlighted the Chinese government's plans to invest over three billion dollars to develop China's inland waterways, on developing navigable channels within China, widening gates and shipping lanes at the Three Gorges Dam, encourage private industry to invest in ports and land infrastructure, and developing Smart Cities by analyzing real-time traffic data.

The U.S. - China Transportation Forum is a by-product of the Strategic and Economic Dialogue (S&ED). Initiated in 2008 upon the signing of a "Joint Declaration on Transportation Cooperation", today the TF serves as the ideal Forum for high-level, multi-modal transportation discussion between the U.S. and China. Through the TF, we work with our Chinese counterparts to develop productive, proactive, and mutually beneficial solutions to common transportation challenges.

This important annual bilateral serves to review progress made among the various TF Working Groups and has launched such past deliverables as Memorandums of Cooperation between transit authorities, as well as cooperation on research, best practices, and data exchange.

The Transportation Forum over the Years



The U.S.-China Transportation Forum was created in 2008 with the goal of advancing bilateral cooperation through collaborative dialogue. We're especially proud to report that what was once primarily a government to government forum has now grown to include robust private sector participation.

According to Deputy Secretary of Transportation, John Porcari, *"the inclusion of the private sector is a win-win. It's an opportunity*

for American companies to gain deeper insight into the Chinese ministries and regulations that impact their business operations. In turn, active U.S. industry participation helps to shape the conversation and to identify future areas of cooperation with our Chinese counterparts."

Since 2008, a series of working groups have been firmly established to promote and execute critical deliverables. The current TF Working Groups are:

- 1. New Technologies in Transport (Rail)
- 2. Hazardous Materials
- 3. Urban Congestion
- 4. Safety and Disaster Assistance Coordination
- 5. Ports and Inland Waterways Initiative

The TF was thus structured as a unique forum to address mutual issues of concern but also designed to be as flexible as possible in order to address issues through the above Working Groups and as needed. Among the many projects these Working Groups have delivered over the years are "paired cities" Memorandums of Cooperation (MOC) signed between city transit authorities and between U.S. and Chinese research institutions - all with the goal of strengthening collaboration, and exchanging data, research, and best practices on the challenges of urban congestion.
